# Thematic Overview of Genesis 1-12 - Pt 5

A Theology of Work

We continue our series on a *Thematic Overview of Genesis 1-12*. So far, we focused on God, His creation of all things in 6 literal days, that were *very good*. We answered questions that arise and addressed dinosaurs. Today, we will study *a theology of work*.


A. What is a Theology of Work? It means we look at work from God's perspective. We all have our view of work... But understanding God's perspective or view of work is key for the Christian. This helps us see our "job" is more than a job, but something God has given to us, to honor Him, provide for our needs and provide for the needs of others, and do it for His glory.

### **B.** The Creation of Work

Genesis 2:15 - The LORD God took the man and put him in the garden of Eden to work it and keep it. - Adam was to care for and maintain the Garden. The word for "work" here is tilling the ground, or labor. "Keep" refers to watching, preserving or having a charge over. He was responsible to take care of the ground.

ESV Study Bible Note: Genesis 2:15-16 - "The man is put in the garden to work it and keep it. The term "work" (Hb. 'abad; cf. v. 5; 3:23; 4:2, 12; Prov. 12:11; 28:19) denotes preparing and tending, and "keep" (Hb. shamar) adds to that idea. ... Productive work is part of God's good purpose for man in creation. Later, the same two verbs are used together of the work undertaken by the priests and

Levites in the tabernacle ("minister" or "serve" [Hb. 'abad] and "guard" [Hb. shamar]; e.g., Num. 3:7-8; 18:7). The man's role is to be not only a gardener but also a guardian... And the LORD God commanded the man. The fact that the command was given to Adam implies that God gave "the man" a leadership role, including the responsibility to guard and care




### **B.** The Creation of Work

Before sin, work would have been a joy. Adam would have recognized his responsibility and role were given directly by God. Because of the good relationship he had with Him, he would have seen this as a result of being made in God's image, and would have gladly obeyed. Adam was to explain what God said to Eve...



While Eve was deceived, Romans 5 says God puts the fault on Adam. He was created first. He had the responsibility to teach Eve what God said, and once they partook of the forbidden fruit, things changed.

Genesis 3:17-19 - And to Adam he said, "Because you have listened to the voice of your wife and have eaten of the tree of which I commanded you, 'You shall not eat of it,' cursed is the ground because of you; in pain you shall eat of it all the days of your life; 18thorns and thistles it shall bring forth for you; and you shall eat the plants of the field.



# C. The Difficulty of Work

# 1. Cursed is the ground

God cursed the ground, not Adam and Eve. The ground was cursed, because of man's sin. This was not a local situation, but affected the earth! Wherever there is ground, it was cursed by God because of Adam's sin. To curse is the opposite of bless. It refers to death and judgment.

# C. The Difficulty of Work

2. It will be painful to work

God said it will be painful for him and all of humanity to eat from the ground from then on. The word for "pain" also means "toil," or it's going to be difficult to work the ground from now on. This is also mentioned in verse 19a - by the sweat of your face...



# C. The Difficulty of Work

3. The ground will rebel

Part of the reason it will be so difficult is because the land will rebel against those whom were given the responsibility to take care of it! Thistles and thorns grew as a result of sin.




4. We will die

While this is not the main focus for our study today, God says they, and we, will return to the ground from which we were taken, because of sin. Death is the result of sin!

### D. The Value of Work

Though work became difficult, there is still great value in it! Though it changed after the fall, or after sin entered the world, God still told Adam that he had to work. He still had a job to do! Adam and Eve were still responsible to take care of and use the ground for their life sustenance, for



### D. The Value of Work

Work gives us purpose. It can help develop our confidence. Yes, work can be difficult and working with others who make it difficult can diminish our confidence.

But, work helps us to complete a task, fulfill a need, and give us a sense of accomplishment.

### D. The Value of Work

Work gives us an opportunity to better ourselves. We have to get an education to work. For some that means college, and for others it means a vocational school. We need to improve in order to work. When we find a job, we hope there are opportunities for growth within that job.

1. We Work for the Lord

Ephesians 6:5-9 - Bondservants (slaves), obey your earthly masters with fear and trembling, with a sincere heart, as you would Christ, 6not by the way of eye-service, as people-pleasers, but as bondservants of Christ, doing the will of God from the heart, 7rendering

service with a good will as to the Lord and not to man, 8knowing that whatever good anyone does, this he will receive back from the Lord, whether he is a bondservant or is free. 9Masters, do the same to them, and stop your threatening, knowing that he who

is both their Master (*Lord*) and yours is in heaven, and that there is no partiality with him.

Paul summarizes this in Colossians 4:1.

### 1. We Work for the Lord

While we do work or labor for a manager, owner or corporation, ultimately, a Christian looks beyond his or her boss to the Lord. Colossians 3:23-24 - Whatever you do, work heartily, as for the Lord and not for men, 24knowing that from the Lord you will receive the inheritance as your reward. You are serving the Lord Christ.



give you in ourselves an example to imitate. 10For even when we were with you, we would give you this command: If anyone is not willing to work, let him not eat. 11For we hear that some among you walk in idleness, not busy at work, but busybodies. 12Now

Scripture warns about laziness: Proverbs 6:6-

11; 12:27; 13:4; 20:4; 21:25-26; 22:13; 24:30-

34; 26:13-16; Matthew 25:24-30; Ephesians

4:28; 1 Thessalonians 4:10-12;

2 Thessalonians 3:6-12; 1 Timothy 5:8, 13.



3. We Work to Provide for Others

Ephesians 4:27 - Let the thief no longer steal, but rather let him labor, doing honest work with his own hands, so that he may have something to share with anyone in need.

3. We Work to Provide for Others

The thief uses his/her hands to take. When salvation comes, that person is to work. He or she is to do an honest day's work, with... his own hands. This is not just to provide for his/her needs, but to give away to those in need...

Overworking or business is a struggle for some. Just because you are busy, does not mean you are productive. Often, when we are too busy, we have a problem with our priorities. Yes, some cultures require more work than others as an unspoken expectation. But as Christians, we have a choice, to keep our priorities Biblical, or cultural.

Even if we have a job, we can become lazy. The warnings of the Bible still apply in that situation. One danger, particularly for men, is to find our identity in work (or ministry). Work is part of what we do, but not who we are. Work should not define us, though it is a major part of our life.

Another danger, and this is prominent in the church, is to see "ministry" as sacred and separate from a "secular" job. That is a misconception and an unbiblical concept. Every legitimate form of work can be an act of worship to the Lord, as Scripture says. The sacred – secular split is not a Biblical concept.

"It is not the fruit of our labors but the focus of our heart that gives value to our work in the sight of God. Thus, "secular" work becomes spiritual when it is done to please God, and "religious" work becomes secular when it is done to please and impress people."
